#### **COOK ISLANDS CAMPUS**

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## Purpose:

Government funding of education is extremely important and investment in education programmes influences the choices students of education make. This proposal seeks to identify a solution to a number of issues made apparent to USP by Principals and teachers. The USP Bachelor of Education (B.Ed.) was discussed with MoE Senior Management Team late 2019 and was supported by the Secretary (see Appendix A). Government funding of education is extremely important. The analysis below offers an insight into how Government could increase their return on the money invested into education. Offer of a full time Bachelor of Education (B. Ed) programme would:

- Increase the number of teachers with a B.Ed.
- A fully qualified teaching work force significantly strengthens Cook Islands education sector capacity and capability;
- Address the current shortage of qualified teachers;
- Support many teachers who are working while studying as it takes approximately 12 years for them to become qualified after leaving the MoE programme;
- Streamline the process to become a qualified teacher in the Cook Islands as currently students of the MoE teacher training programme are confused about what qualification they graduate with.

Below is a cost analysis of the two programmes on offer for teacher training.<sup>1</sup>

### Concurrent Teacher Training programme (Ministry of Education)<sup>2</sup>

The MoE financially support teachers working in schools as they pay for their USP B. Ed papers. They also fund the training of students who are accepted into the Concurrent Teacher Training programme (CTT).<sup>3</sup>

Students graduate with a **Certificate of Education** (USP). However, students who graduate from the CTT programme are then required by MoE policy to continue to work towards attaining a degree.<sup>6</sup> To complete a degree while teaching full time will take them another approximately 12 years at an extra cost of \$13,245 per student. However, there are other costs involved, as teacher's juggle full time teaching, families, and part time study, which often hinder their progress to completing their qualification and perhaps have implications on their daily work also.

Students graduate with a **Certificate in Teaching** and a **Bachelor of Education** in addition to **three papers in Cook Islands Maori towards a Certificate in Pacific Vernacular Language: Cook Islands Maori**. If it was desired, the B. Ed programme could be a normal three-year degree rather than accelerated. Costs per student for a 3-year B. Ed would then be \$54,865.

#### In summary

November 2020 analysis by USP of teacher qualifications has shown 104 teachers across the country are currently teaching with no B.Ed. Increasing the number of teachers with a B.Ed. qualification would significantly strengthen Cook Islands education sector capacity and capability. The USP B.Ed. is an internationally recognised qualification. Facilitating a B.Ed. full time and in-country would also save annual recruitment costs spent endeavoring to recruit teachers from overseas. If the costs for the USP B.Ed. were covered by Cook Islands Government, and students bonded as their repayment, then teaching shortages could also be addressed. This programme could possibly even encourage Cook Islanders living overseas to come home to train and then teach. In 2019 USP had 38 people who registered interest in doing this full time degree but as there was no financing available they did not enroll due to being unable to afford the tuition costs and give up their paid employment. Ultimately, fully qualified teachers will give our children a full educational experience which they are entitled to. Something entirely in line with the Education Master Plan.

In the meantime, we will progress with in-house discussions that will inform any future meetings.
